Summer of shows

High levels of public confidence in policing can lead to increased crime reporting, which helps Cheshire Constabulary tackle crime and support victims.

It is important to me that I represent all of Cheshire's communities and develop the trust that they have in my role and their police service. Throughout the summer I have attended the Royal Cheshire Show, the Nantwich Show, Disability Awareness Day and Chester Pride, to hear from various communities about their experience and expectations of policing in Cheshire.





Project Cherish

Through my Police Innovation Fund 3,000 neurodiverse children across Cheshire have been issued with seatbelt covers. These contain information on the child's condition for emergency responders to collisions where the driver is incapacitated.



Making Cheshire's roads safer

I have purchased new speeding devices, which will enable each of Cheshire's nine policing teams to monitor more local roads and build data to support enforcement action.

I have also been working with Cheshire's Local Authorities on schemes to install cameras at hotspots in their area. Two installations are set to begin before Christmas.
